SUNDAY NIGHT BLAZE DESTROYS WELLAND CHURCH

When a fire started Sunday, March 24 at 6:30pm inside the Be In Christ Church, Kevin VE3RRH and wife Lynn, VE3FNY, had a front row seat as flames shot through the roof! The church was located just over their backyard fence. Around 10pm smoke whipped up by 80km/h winds filled the couple's home, they needed to evacuate. Welland firefighters poured gallons of water on the building in freezing temperatures, leaving the scene until 2:30am. An early estimate set damages at \$750,000. Photos Kevin took the next morning showed an inch of ice had covered his house and his radio antennas. His favourite R7 vertical antenna was no longer vertical under the weight of the ice.



Kevin writes, "attached to my garage is a 24 ft tower with my beloved Cushcraft R7 antenna. Now anyone who knows me know I constantly sing the praises of this antenna and my Cushcraft R5. Can you imagine my shock to return home on Monday to find my house, garage, yard and antennas coated in more than an inch of ice, and my R7 laying at almost a 90 degree angle to the tower. The winds were still blowing hard but were diminishing and the ice prevented me from rescuing my antenna for over 2 weeks. It took 3 days of sunshine to melt the ice off the

antenna and when it was finally free it rose to about a 25 degree lean, the second and third straight sections of the antenna had major bends just above the joints. After 2 weeks of waiting I was finally able remove the R7 and replace it with my R5. During the wait I still managed to work many FT8 contacts on the R7, the antenna preformed well and the SWR never changed.

The last report from Kevin was he replaced some tubing and the antenna is ready to re-install on the tower. Kevin was NPARC President from 1993 to 1995.

In general, Amateur Radio operators are welcome to day use these Parks Canada sites. Some suggestions include parking in designated areas, operate from your vehicle, bring your own table and chair where there may not be a picnic table, use battery power, bring your own antenna which may be on a tripod or strung in the trees, proudly wear your NPARC member id, be safety conscious and use safety traffic cones to demarcate your operating area and mark your feedlines with caution flags. Note that popup sun shades are considered to be tents and as such are not permitted unless a permit in the order of \$2,000 per day is obtained.

Amateur radio club set to hold ham radio classes

The image of a ham radio operator sitting alone in the dark corner of the basement with his or her and 10 where the eight-foot-high antenna equipment may have happened in the "old days," says Fort Erie's Stephen Riddle.

But the president of the Niagara Peninsula Amateur Radio Club (NPARC) says that is no longer true and it's a perception that the club's radio enthusiasts a contact log. It will be about another week hope to change.

"Amateur radio, (or ham as it's known to most people) is both a hobby and a service," he explains.

The NPARC offers Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES), which is amateur operator volunteers service members organized and ready to assist in public service and emergency communications. Should a national emergency or a regional emergency arise, Riddle says volunteers are ready to assist local hospitals and the Region.

"We do events like the Ride for Roswell, the Canada Day Parade and the Niagara Falls Santa Claus Parade. We are able to assist different organizations in the event of emergencies." Speaking about the hobby aspect of ham radio, Riddle says it's "a lot of fun."

"We're able to talk to people around the world using communications. There are all sorts of digital communications. There's satellite, radio and the internet. There's so much to it now." Club members recently competed in a QSO Party, a world-wide event that is held for fun to give amateur radio operators an opportunity to connect with other enthusiasts. person and includes a study guide. people could be contacted using the antenna. Several club members gathered at the Black Community Centre on stood and attempted to contact other clubs. We definitely made a few contacts. Italy and Cuba were the furthest ones," Riddle says.

After the event, the local club submitted or two until the winner of the contest is announced, once the data has been compiled. While amateur radio is an important hobby and skill to have, Riddle admits it is a challenge to find new recruits for the NPARC, which currently has 60 members

"The challenge today is getting the younger people interested in the hobby," he says.

"The technology side of it is just amazing. There's so much more to it than talking on the radio anymore."

He says forms of communication that people use regularly-the Internet and phones-aren't always available in the event of an emergency.

Riddle notes that during recent hurricanes, several islands in the Caribbean had no communication and amateur radio was the only way to communicate with people. To operate a ham radio, Riddle says a licence is required. NPARC is offering classes at the Black Creek Community Centre beginning April 18.

The classes will be held Thursday nights at 7 p.m. and run for eight weeks. The cost is \$70 per

Three messages were send successfully. Debriefing was held to review points of interest. Some lessons were learned and corrective actions taken. We will be conducting more exercises throughout the spring and summer.

We are looking at ways to expand our digital capabilities in the future.

I'm really keen on CNPOTA 2019. Low power SSB portable operation is my cup of tea. I tried to activated the Ridgeway Battlefield historic site on old highway 3 west of Ft. Erie in March. Outside in the cold I made one contact with my 20 watts and chatted with a ham sitting in a warm Florida park. BTW, did you know it was the Irish Americans, called Fenians, who attacked Ridgeway hoping to free pre-confederation Canada from British rule. The site has a nice covered pavilion but as the rules state, don't take over and ruin the experience for any visitors using the park. Much closer to my QTH are the bulk of the available Niagara CNPOTA sites. A simple cairn enclosed behind a low fence with a gate is at the extreme north end of the 9-hole Niagara-on-the-Lake golf course over-looking Lake Ontario. It marks an 1812 battlefield that was two miles west of here. There is a small parking lot but it is currently full of construction equipment and no parking signs are posted. Work is progressing on a long section of shoreline and a roadway has been constructed below the bank to facilitate that. Two other historic sites are virtually hidden up the road on the golf course. Fort Mississauga is one and the site of the 1804 Mississauga Point lighthouse, is the other. The lighthouse is long gone from a spot near the old red brick fort. It was the first lighthouse on the Great Lakes and marked the entrance to the Niagara River. It's a beautiful location where you get two activations and enjoy the water view at the same time. My kit bag is packed and I'm ready to go!
